Dear members and friends of the Village of Takoma Park,





In Takoma Park all of us can end up limiting our interaction with neighbors to the ones on our block – the Village has provided numerous ways for us to expand our personal neighborhoods.

This is a good time to recall some of the Village's highlights over the past 12 months. Among other things, our membership has grown to almost 250 people; our transportation services have grown to an average of 92 rides per month to

members (up from an average of 80 per month in 2018); and the kinds of services we provide have expanded to include more social and cultural events. With this expansion we have added an accountant and a part-time administrative assistant to our team. Both our accountant, Ismenia Peña-Romero, and our administrative aide, Robin Walker, have provided invaluable help to the Village and our members.

With the expansion, our need for more help, both in terms of volunteers and funds, has increased. We hope you will consider a tax-deductible donation to support our efforts. Recent Village Events

With the help of a grant from the City of Takoma Park, we launched our cultural arts programming in late August and have sponsored to date the following events:

August 29: Museum visit to the Phillips Collection, for their special exhibit, "The Warmth of Other Suns: Stories of Global Displacement." The exhibit, now closed, presented historical and contemporary works by approximately 75 artists posing urgent questions related to experiences and perceptions of migration and the current global refugee crisis.

September 18: Book talk by bestselling author Naomi Klein on her new book, *On Fire: The (Burning) Case for a Green New Deal*, in which she makes the case for a Green New Deal, explaining how bold climate action can be a blueprint for a just and thriving society. This event was sponsored by Politics and Prose.

September 28: House Concert with John W. Warren performing a program of Latin guitar in a Takoma Park home.

October 4: Museum visit to Glenstone

The Village of Takoma Park and the Forever Young program of the City of Takoma Park hosted a trip to Glenstone, a private nonprofit museum in Potomac open to the public by appointment only. Nineteen Village members (and friends) went, on a beautiful fall day. Most had not been before and were amazed at the beauty and breadth of the museum and its grounds. Those who completed the post-event evaluation were very positive about the trip, though some felt that the three hours was not enough. The museum includes outdoor sculptures, an outdoor sound installation representing the noises one hears in a forest over the course of 1,000 years, and galleries with sculpture and painting from a host of famous 20th-century artists, with knowledgeable guides to enhance the visitor's appreciation.

As Glenstone's founders have expanded their museum, they have focused on sustainability inside and out, reclaiming land and returning it to its more natural state and re-creating streambeds and wetlands. They have partnered with Montgomery County public schools to host more than 5,000 students, many of whom had never been to an art museum before.



Glenstone provides golf carts for those who need transportation around the outdoor areas but to see all the outdoor sculpture one needs to be able to walk on gravel paths, up some slopes and cover at least 2 miles over the course of the visit. On the other hand, much is accessible to someone using a wheelchair.

The museum is free, and the Village plans to run trips there at least twice a year. Come (or come back) with us on April 10. Watch for the signup soon!

October 25: Museum visit to the National Gallery of Art for a guided tour of Renaissance collections.

October 26: **House concert with Rupert Wates** offering an eclectic mix of acoustic, melodic art/folk, with flavors of jazz, vaudeville and cabaret, in a Takoma Park home.

October 28: **Book talk with New York Times columnist Gail Collins** at Politics and Prose, on her new book, *No Stopping Us Now: A History of Older Women in America.*

Aging Well Event: Money Management

Grant Wing, Executive Director of The Society for Financial Awareness (SOFA), joined a group of 25 people for a presentation on money management. From useful tips on budgeting, retirement savings, reverse mortgages and life insurance, a robust discussion was quickly underway. Mr. Wing was well versed on all aspects of money management and able to assist participants with all their questions. He also devoted time to the importance of protecting oneself from scams and frauds, giving examples of what to avoid and how to spot a potential problem. Aging Well Event: Getting Your Affairs in Order

Elder law attorney Bernadette Sweeney (sweeneylegal.com) gave a well-received presentation to close to 40 attendees on how, and more importantly why, folks need to get their affairs in order. From explaining that everyone needs a will, no matter how few their assets, to

delving into the intricacies of probate law, Ms. Sweeney covered a host of legal issues important to all. Ms. Sweeney outlined the structures needed in case of a medical disability or death for family members to successfully navigate the complicated settling of an estate.

She stressed the importance of maintaining a master list of your important information – your financial information; names of lawyer, financial adviser, insurance agent; Internet passwords; a memo describing how you'd like your personal property to be distributed upon your death; information on any loans you've made or outstanding debts; people to contact in the event of your death; and information on any funeral wishes or pre-arrangements. 

Errand Service: If you have stopped driving, can no longer get around easily, and need something that you (or a friend or family member) are unable to order online or from a delivery service, we can help if you are a Village member. Note that for insurance reasons, errands are done by volunteers alone; not in a car with the member requesting the errand.

Friendly Visitors/Callers: Village volunteers provide visits to Takoma Park elders who cannot get out as much as they might like, as well as offer phone calls several times a week. Senior Stroll: How easy is it for you to go out for a walk? Some people are concerned about tripping, falling, or getting lost. The Village of Takoma Park has a senior stroll program which matches a volunteer or two with a senior who wants to go for a walk once or twice a week. Each volunteer is a member of the Village of Takoma Park and has had a criminal background check. Small Home Repairs/Tasks: The Village of Takoma Park has a team of volunteers ready to do small home repairs and tasks around the house for members who have no other access to help for minor repairs or chores (moving furniture, replacing high light bulbs, etc.). **Larger Home Improvements:** We can help incomequalified members apply for larger home improvements that are beyond the scope of our small home repairs teams. Applications go to Rebuilding Montgomery or Habitat for Humanity, both parts of the Lifelong Homes Coalition. These repairs may include minor plumbing and electrical work; roofing, floor, and ceiling repair; interior and exterior painting; installation of grab bars; and building of ramps.

If you are a Village member in need of help, call 301-646-2109. Volunteers will contact you to arrange an evaluation of your job and determine if it can be done by the small home repair team, or if not, if you are eligible to apply through Rebuilding Montgomery.

SUPPORT GROUPS:

The Movement Disorder Support Group was started in response to interest from Takoma Park residents with Parkinson's disease, Multiple Sclerosis, and similar conditions.
